

By his Real Presence in the Eucharist Christ fulfils his promise to be with us "always, until the end of the age" (Mt 28:20). As St. Thomas Aguinas wrote, "It is the law of friendship that friends should live together. ... Christ has not left us without his bodily presence in this our pilgrimage, but he joins us to himself in this sacrament in the reality of his body and blood" (Summa Theologiae, III q. 75, a. 1). With this gift of Christ's presence in our midst, the Church is truly blessed. As Jesus told his disciples, referring to his presence among them, "Amen, I say to you, many prophets and righteous people longed to see what you see but did not see it, and to hear what you hear but did not hear it" (Mt 13:17). In the Eucharist the Church both receives the gift of Jesus Christ and gives grateful thanks to God for such a blessing. This thanksgiving is the only proper response, for through this gift of himself in the celebration of the Eucharist under the appearances of bread and wine Christ gives us the gift of eternal life.

Amen, amen, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day. For my flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink. . . . Just as the living Father sent me and I have life because of the Father, so also the one who feeds on me will have life because of me. (Jn 6:53-57)

When the texts of the Mass first went into English in the late 1960s, we were accustomed to a choice of four Memorial Acclamations. The revised translation of the Mass offers just three. Ever since Vatican II, there have always been only three options for the Memorial Acclamation in the Latin original of the Eucharistic Prayers. The first two in English ("Christ has died" and "Dying you destroyed") were both translations of the same one in Latin, though rendered with a different feel. That's what gave us four options for three acclamations.

The revision gives us a more direct translation of the Latin originals, and, as many people notice, "Christ has died" is no longer listed among the options. The other three acclamations have all survived with new translations, but "Christ has died" no longer appears in the list.

The Memorial Acclamation was designed after the Second Vatican Council as a time for the faithful to greet the Risen Christ, present to them now through the consecration of the elements on the altar. All three of the original Latin acclamations were addressed to Jesus Christ, but the first one in English said something about Christ, rather than addressed something to him.

Many Catholics have come to know and love "Christ has died," and its absence from the liturgy causes some loss. However, its meaning is still true. Christ indeed has died, is risen, and will come again. Perhaps this old sung acclamation can be recycled as a musical refrain for Communion or another part of the Mass. Although many feel the loss, there is a gain: Every time we celebrate the Eucharist, we are privileged to greet Christ present on the altar as soon as he comes to us.
