
This year we will continue with our Advent Giving Tree for the families with children in our area who require some help with Christmas.

Church Teaching - Part 6 of 6

The Nicene Creed

I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible.

I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages.

God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven, and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate,

he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified,

who has spoken through the prophets.

I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church.

I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.



CATHOLICS END the Lord's Prayer with the words "but deliver us from evil." Many other Christians add another line: "For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory forever." At the Catholic Mass, after all recite the Lord's Prayer, the priest offers another prayer—the embolism—based on the petition for deliverance from evil. Then all say a doxology: "For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours now and forever."

The Lord's Prayer appears in the Bible twice, at Luke 11:1–4 and Matthew 6:9–13. Both evangelists probably drew the prayer from a now lost source of the sayings of Jesus. Luke's is shorter and may be more original. But Matthew's is the one that Christians know from memory. The most ancient manuscripts of these Gospels do not include the final doxology.

At the end of the first century, Matthew's version of the Lord's Prayer appeared in a document called the *Didache*, or the "Teaching of the Twelve Apostles." It concluded with the words "for the power and the glory are yours for ever." Later editions of the Bible added that doxology to the prayer in Matthew's Gospel. As history unfolded, some Bibles added the doxology to Matthew's Lord's Prayer. Others did not. And families of Christians learned the prayer in different ways.

During the Second Vatican Council, when the ecumenical movement was strong, Roman Catholics added the doxology to the Communion Rite of the Mass, but separated it from the Lord's Prayer by means of the embolism. Including the doxology affirms the tradition of other Christians, detaching it from the text honors the original version of the Lord's Prayer, and praying it gives praise to God.
